WHO'S WHO in the CAST

CAROLENE ADAMS-EVANS (Miss Ruth, Sister Russell)—a member of the Grammy-nominated Richard Smallwood Singers, Ms. Adams-Evans is a native of Washington, DC. She began singing in the choir of St. Judah's Baptist Church, has performed on several recordings and appeared in Mahalia's Song at Howard University. She thanks God for her gift.

SARITA ALLEN (Rita, the manicurist)began her dance training at the age of three in her hometown, Seattle, Washington and continued in New York, winning scholarships from the Dance Theatre of Harlem, Alvin Ailey Dance Company and Joffrey Ballet. She performed with Agnes de Mille and was a principal dancer with Alvin Ailey. Film credits include The Cotton Club, Beat Street and The Last Dragon, as well as several music videos, including Torture by The Jacksons. She appeared in the PBS-TV production of For Colored Girls and numerous Alvin Ailey TV specials. She recently assisted Judith Jamison on several projects, including a ballet for Maurice Bejart's Ballet of the 20th Century, Ms. Allen has appeared in special White House performances and in royal performances throughout Europe.

LISA BURROUGHS (Aunt Hannah, Sister Thomas)—recording artist and currently a member of the Grammy-nourinated Richard Smallwood Singers, Ms. Burroughs has also performed with Leonyne Price (Gospel in Performance at the White House). Edwin Hawkins (Gospel at the Symphony). Tremaine Hawkins, Larnelle Harris and a host of others. She appeared as Glenda in the Washington, DC. production of The Wiz and was a featured guest soloist with Jessie Dixon in Peace Child. Her motto in life is "Stay with God and he will make all things come out right."

FELICIA Y. COLEMAN (Louise Lemon, Rosa Parks)-a native of Chicago, Ms. Coleman is a coloratura soprano with a B.A. and Masters in Music from Howard University, where she studied with the renowned Mattiwilda Dobbs, Ms. Coleman is a soloist with the Rev. Clay Evans Revival Tours and performs on tour with comedian/activist, Dick Gregory. She has performed at conventions for National Baptists USA, National Religious Broadcasters and National Women in Television. She also sang at Pres. Jimmy Carter's Inaugural Prayer Breakfast, at several campaign fundraisers for Chicago Mayor, Harold Washington and during the funeral service for Marvin Gaye. Ms. Coleman is a member of the Fellowship M.B. Church in Chicago, Rev. Clay Evans, pastor, which has watered the seed of her God-given talent.

WAYNE DAVIS (Author, Sanctified Preacher, Janitor Deacon, Eddie Robinson)—recording artist, arranger and producer, Mr. Davis was discovered by Roberta Flack with whom he toured and who produced his first Atlantic Records album, Wayne Davis—I View From Another Place. He can also be heard on Blackfire Records (Wayne Davis) and other recordings produced by him include What We Must Do and The Soldiers, by Edward Duncan III. He performed in Soul which was filmed in Acera, Ghana; wrote and produced A Tribute to Africa, a film for Africare and the U.S. State Department; and

wrote and produced the documentary Impressions, based on Duke Ellington's Sacred Music. He appeared in the Kennedy Center production of Miss Truth and with the national touring company of The Wiz.

GERMAINE EDWARDS (Redeap, Policeman)—a graduate of New York's famed High School of the Performing Arts, Mr. Edwards appeared on Broadway and with the national touring company of The Wizas the Winged Monkey. He recently returned from a Wiz tour of Japan where he performed the same role. He has been seen in Italy and France in Bob Fosse's Pancin'. Germaine is a member of the Dance Theatre of Harlem and has appeared in many music videos. This one is for Mon!

DOUG ESKEW (Reverend Dekes) comes to Sing, Mahalia, Sing after completing two successful tours in Europe. He was first featured in Hazel Bryant's production of Black Nativity: then he returned to star in the world tour of Ain't Misbehavin. He has toured throughout the United States in such productions as Purlie, Guys And Dolls. Ain't Mishehavin, Mahalia and Black Nativits: Doug is an accomplished concert artist, having been featured with Reverand James Cleveland, the Donald Vails Choraleers and the Detroit Symphony. He has performed his own cabaret show in New York, Detroit, Los Angeles, Finland and Sweden. A native Detroiter, Doug gives thanks to God, who has made all these things possible. Doug dedicates his performance to the loving memory of his father, Mr. Willie R.

MARVA HICKS (Young Mahalia, Beauty)
Operator, Reporter)—made her Broadway
debut in Lena Horne: The Lady And Her
Mixic and went on to perform with the national and European touring companies, as
well as in the Showtime and PBS-TV productions. Her other credits include the national tours of Eubic and One Mo Time,
and the Off-Broadway production, A... My
Name Is Alice Ms. Hicks has recorded with
vibraharpist Roy Ayers, has been heard on
Infinity Records and seen in several national commercials.

JENNIFER HOLLIDAY (Mahalia Jackson)-literally had stardom thrust upon her at only 18 years old, when she went from church choirs and local productions right to the Broadway stage. Her deep, rich tones and wall-shaking power made her the immediate star of the 1979 Broadway production of Your Arms Too Short To Box With God. And direct from that triumph, Jennifer joined Michael Bennett's mysterious 1980 "project" which was to become Dreamgirls, one of the greatest hits Broadway has ever seen. With her unparalleled show-stopper, "And I'm Telling You I'm Not Going," Holliday was deluged with critical acclaim, instantaneous audience devotion and superstandom. She won the coveted Tony Award for Best Actress in a Musical, a Grammy Award for her legendary solo and an indisputable reputation for vocal excellence. Born in Houston, Texas in 1960, Jennifer Holliday was in the nationally renowned choir at Pleasant Grove Baptist Church, one of the largest black congregations in Houston. Gospel, combined with an early and immediate passion for the music of Aretha Franklin and D.J. Rogers,

were the formative ingredients in Jennifer's

emotionally resonant style. While performing in a benefit for a local black theatre company, Jennifer was discovered in true Hollywood style, Jamie Patterson, a dancer in the road company of A Chorus Line was so taken with her remarkable talent, he arranged for Jennifer's Box audition, got his aunt to agree to host her during her stay and he paid for Jennifer's plane ticket to New York. The rest, as they say, is history. In 1983 she recorded her first album, Feel My Soul. for Geffen Records. It was an instant hit Jennifer was nominated for a Grammy that year for Best Female Vocal/R&B. She has just completed a successful concert tour and her second album, Say You Love Me, will be released early this Spring.

STEPHANIE JAMES-RAINEY (Eastern Star Member, Waitress)—a recording artist, Ms. James-Rainey was previously a member of the musical group Unlimited Touch. She performed with Jennifer Holliday during her 1984 national concert tour. Sing, Mahalia, Sing is Ms. James-Rainey's first theatrical appearance.

JAMES ARTHUR JOHNSON (Chafalava. Media Announcer)-was born in Cleveland where he was a member of the prestigious Karamu House Theatre. Mr. Johnson worked with the Howard University Drama Department before moving to New York last year to broaden his acting experience. He appeared off-Broadway in Golden Boy and Street Heat. His additional credits include regional productions of Across The River Harlem Renaissance, Ti-Jean, Black Nativity, Medea, Spell #7, The Wiz, Black Orpheus, We Wear The Mask and Supper. He recreated his role as the Preacher in the PBS-TV production of We Wear The Mask and was a lead vocalist on international tour with the Marine Corps

TYRONE JOLIVET (Angel of God, Chicago Minister)-is a Fisk University graduate and former member of the famed Fisk Jubilee Singers. He made his operatic debut in 1978 as Don Jose in Carmen with the Windsor Operatic Society in London, His American debut came in 1979 as Alfredo in La Traviata with the Nashville Symphony Orchestra. Tyrone made his Broadway debut in 1983 as Robbins in the Sherwin M. Goldman production of Porgy and Bess and subsequently sang Robbins and Crabman on the international tour. Although a native of Houston, he has lived in Nashville for the past 11 years. Tyrone wishes to thank Valija Bumbulis, his voice teacher of 11 years, for her friendship, patience and exceptional teaching, and his family for their love and support through the years.

DOTTIE JONES (Sue)-began singing at the age of seven in Washington, D.C. She began her professional career in 1979 with the Grammy-nominated Richard Smallwood Singers and was cited by the Washington Post for her performance with the Singers at the Smithsonian Institution. She inspired a standing ovation at Washington's Kennedy Center during a performance with Edwin Hawkins and performed with the Singers and Leontyne Price in a special televised Christmas presentation for President and Mrs. Reagan. Ms. Jones has appeared with the Singers as a guest vocalist on the albums of other top gospel artists, including Larnelle Harris, Sandi Patti and Bill Gaither.

WHO'S WHO in the CAST

GLENN JONES (The Minister, Prince Johnson, Reverend Jameson))—born in Jacksonville, Florida, is, at only 24 years old, a gospel veteran with a 20 year music career under his belt, Mr. Jones is also one of gospel's greatest cross-over successes. His recent single, "Show Me," was Number 3 on Billboard's R&B chart and his is the voice which is heard with Dionne Warwick on "Finder of Lost Loves," the theme song for the popular ABC-TV series. Mr. Jones has performed with James Cleveland, Shirley Ceasar and the Mighty Clouds of Joy. He has two albums on RCA Records, Everybody Loves A Winner and Finesse.

GARRY Q. LEWIS (Emeëe, Floor Mgr., Film Director, Reporter, Policeman)—a native of Minneapolis, Mr. Lewis began his career at the age of 13 with the Minneapolis Children's Theatre Company, Upon his arrival in New York he appeared on Broadway in Fubie and Your Arms Too Short To Box With God and on the television special, Sophisticated Ladies. He appeared with the national touring companies of The Wig (Scarecrow) and Bubblin Brown Sugar and in Los Angeles and Las Vegas in Sophisticated Ladies. He will soon be seen in a national Candon Street Will soon be seen in a national Canada Dry ginger ale commercial.

EUGENE LITTLE (Policeman) is a dancer, teacher, choreographer, and producer of dance events. He has performed with the George Faison Universal Dance Experience, The Juilliard Dance Ensemble, the Clark Center Dance Festivals, and the Dancemobile. His Broadway credits include Dancin', Raisin, The Wiz, Porgy and Bess, and Timbuktu where he appeared as a featured dancer. He has been seen in television commercials, Saturday Night Live, a Jerry Lewis Telethon, a Bob Hope Special, Showtime's Purlie, and in N.E.T.'s dance series. He has also appeared with Dionne Warwick at the Riviera Hotel in Las Vegas and Melba Moore at Philharmonic Hall in New York, Mr. Little has taught dance throughout the country and has choreographed for the Amas Repertory Theatre production of Come Laugh and Cry with Langston Hughes, the Juba Dance Company, Schwezwae Powell: A Petite Powerhouse in New York, for Kaori Murata in Tokyo, Japan. and for the Syvilla Ford Dance Company where he served as assistant artistic director. He was chosen to re-choreograph a 1930's solo performance by Miss Ford for a documentary film entitled, Syvilla, They Danced To Her Drum. He also served as the choreographer for The Day of the Child, a benefit concert for Cambodian children. His movie credits include The Wiz, The Cotton Club, and Secret Sounds Screaming.

MICHELLE RENÉ LOVETT (Mildred Falls)—a native New Yorker, Ms. Lovett began singing in the Baptist church at the age of 7 and as a teenager performed with the Bronx Boro-Wide and All-City Chortuses. Her professional career began with a 5-year stint as Sam & Davés opening act and went on to perform with flom Browne, Jack-Sass and Shirley Alston. She appeared Olf-Broadway in Manna, I Want To Sing as Sarah Vaughn and Sister Carrie, where she was discovered by Jennifer Holliday. Ms. Lovett recently appeared with Ms. Holliday during her 1984 national concert tour.

JOE LYNN (Ike Hunkenhull, Chicago Minister)—a native of Cleveland, Mr. Lynn is well known there from his years as Director of Black Studies at Cuyahoga Community College and as the founder of the Metro Liberation Chorale. He was first seen in New York in Timbuktu with Eartha Kitt and has spent the past three years on Broadway as Tiny Joe Dixon in Dreamgids. His film credits include Moscow On The Hudson, The Cotton Club, The Jerk and The Wiz. Mr. Lynn's first starring film role is in Tenament, which will be released this Spring.

ESTHER MARROW (Alternate Mahalia)

-has spanned the musical spectrum from

gospel to gutsy blues, with strong strains of pop and jazz. Hailed from London's Albert Hall, where she gave a Royal Command Performance, to Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas, Marrow's rich, dark voice is a spectacular instrument. Whether she is gravely whispering or gleefully shouting, no material is beyond her emotional range. Esther's musical acclaim inevitably led her to Broadway, where she was featured in The Wiz, Comin'Uptown and It's So Nice To Be Civilized. She won raves in the world premiere of On Shiloh Hill at Ford's Theatre in Washington, D.C. and was praised for her performance in Duke Ellington: The Music Lives On, a PBS-TV Special. In addition to her theatrical work, Miss Marrow has performed in an eclectic variety of settings, including the prestigious gospel altar of St. Ann's Church. In every venue, in every genre, Marrow has brought a sanctity to her work without being solemn. Discovered by Harry Belafonte, with whom she's performed often, she has also shared the spotlight with such popular artists as Count Bassie, Lena Horne, Thelonius Monk, Ella Fitzgerald, B.B. King, Miriam Makeba and Chick Corea. Miss Marrow toured tirelessly with Martin Luther King, a close friend, performing at fundraisers in the U.S. and Europe. At one such event, she sang with Mahalia Jackson and in later years played the title role in Mahalia at Connecticut's Hartman Theatre. Esther's is a familiar voice in television and radio commercials and she has also recorded two albums: Esther Marrow-Sister Woman for Fantasy Records and Newport News Virginia-Exther Marrow, on the Flying Dutchman label. She can currently be seen in the Motown film, The Last Dragon.

MHITON CRAIG NEALY (Primitive Baptist)—a Chicago native and up-and-coming variety and theatrical artist, Mr. Nealy has appeared in Dreamgirls as James Thunder Early, and recreated Andre De Shields' role in Am't Misbehavin'. His film appearances include The Blues Brothers and The Cotton Club. God bless us all.

JACKI RUFFIN (Aunt Duke, Hair Washer)—Since 1977. Miss Ruffin has travelled extensively in Europe and the United States as a member of the Grammy-nominated Richard Smallwood Singers. As one of the principal soloists, she is best known for her renditions of "I've Got Something" and "Psalm 8." She also appears on the recently released Wesley Boyd Workshop album, soloing on "What Love" and "Perfect Peace." Miss Ruffin is not singing for fame, but to make a difference in the lives of people who hear her; she feels God has sanctified her musical ministry.

BROTHER JOHN SELLERS (Historical Advisor)—is a gospel and blues legend in his own time. Born and raised on the banks of

the Mississippi, Mr. Sellers was the protegee of blues master Big Bill Broonzy, working in Chicago's famous blues clubs with him from the age of 8. He has been a member of the Alvin Ailey Dance Company since 1961 and has been hailed for his performances in the Company's signature work, Revelations, and in Blues Suite. As Mahalia Jackson's real-life godson, Mr. Sellers has shared his knowledge of the life, times and music of Miss Jackson with the creative team and performers of Sing, Mahalia, Sing as the company's historical advisor. Brother John Sellers is the man mainly responsible for giving the younger generation in Sydney, Australia its first taste of genuine blues and gospel singing.

KiKi SHEPARD (Sister Willis)-made her Broadway debut in Bubblin' Brown Sugar and toured Europe with the show's first international tour. She later appeared in The Wiz, Comin' Uptown, Reggae, Your Arms Too Short To Box With God and Porgy and Bess. She was assistant to the choreographer for Apollo and Golden Boy and is currently working on a book about the life of the Broadway "gypsy." Her film credits include The Wiz, Beat Street and The Cotton Club and she can be seen in numerous music videos and television commercials. Ms. Shepard hails from Tyler, Texas and studied with the D.C. Repertory Dance Company. She dedicates this show to God and her family.

KATHERINE SINGLETON (Ensemble), a native of Houston, Texas and graduate of the High School of Performing Arts, works as a model and dancer. She started her professional career with the Houston Grand Opera production of Scott Joplin's opera, Treemonisha, which went on to Broadway. Since then she has been a member of several touring companies including The Wiz, national tour, Bubbling Brown Sugar, and The Wiz Venture in Japan. You may have seen her in the movie The Blues Brothers and as a featured dancer in the movie, Xanadu. Her dancing and modelling career has taken her to Paris, Milano, and Africa. She is currently appearing in a national Canada Dry commercial. She would like to take this opportunity to thank her family for their continuous love and support.

LYNETTE HAWKINS STEPHENS (Mother Weeks)-a California native, is the youngest member of gospel's "first family," the Hawkins. Ms. Hawkins spent many years in church and school choirs before joining Selah, the group formed by Walter Hawkins after the late 1960's success of the Edwin Hawkins Singers. Ms. Hawkins' strong alto solos with The Hawkins Family and Walter's Love Center Choir, as well as with the Edwin Hawkins Singers in recent years, has been the vocal base for more than a dozen hit gospel albums. She has also been an energetic back-up singer for Sly Stone, Van Morrison and Sylvester, among others and is frequently heard in national television commercials. She is now embarking on a solo career and has just signed with Light Records for her first solo

PAUL W. WEEDEN, JR. (Baptizing Ministee, Dr. Marin Luther King, Jr.)—studied at the Jorden School of Music and spent 13 years as a choir director and organist in his native Indianapolis. A former member of the Raymond Raspberry Singers, Mr. Weeden is director of the famous Weeden Family Singers and Liberty District Masc Choir. He has performed with Rev. AI Green and the late Jackie Wilson and recorded with D.J. Rogers. Mr. Weeden appeared as the Preacher in *Your Arms Too Short To Boo With God* in 1983 in Paris and accepted his calling to the ministry in 1984.

GEORGE FAISON (Director, Author, Choreographer)-won a Tony Award for The Wiz and was nominated for another for Porgy and Bess at Radio City Music Hall. He has been a driving force in theatre dance and concert staging for more than 15 years. He has also become a leader in staging concert appearances and music videos, and creating costume designs for a host of top performers, including Stevie Wonder. Melha Moore. Dionne Warwick, Roberta Flack, Ashford & Simpson, Stephanie Mills, Deniece Williams, Natalic Cole, Earth Wind & Fire, Gladys Knight & The Pips, Van McCoy and Joe Williams. Born in Washington, D.C., Faison studied at Howard University and was a principal dancer with the Alvin Ailey Dance Theatre. He went on to create ballets for several leading companies including Ailey's American Dance Theatre. Among his most famous pieces are Tilt, Gazelle, Hobo Sapiens and Suite Otis. Faison appeared in the Broadway musical Purlie and founded the George Faison Universal Dance Experience which toured extensively throughout the U.S. for five years. He has created choreography for Don't Bother Me, I Can't Cope and The Moony Shapiro Song Book on Broadway and for the films Baron Wolfgang von Tripp, Secret Life of Plants, Sergeant Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band and, most recently, The Cotton Club. His 1981 Off-Broadway production, The Apollo, Just Like Magic, was a huge critical success and helped spur interest in the renovation and revival of Harlem's famed entertainment landmark. In addition to his Tony Award, Faison has received Drama Desk, Reve, Miami Critics Circle and Pied Piper awards.

MARTIN WORMAN (Assistant Director) -is a resident director at New York's Theatre for the New City where he has staged the premieres of several new American plays. Last year he won the Villager Downtown Theatre Award for Outstanding Direction for his adaptation of Sherwood Anderson's The Man Who Became A Woman. He was also co-creator of Crimes Against Nature, winner of The San Francisco Drama Critics Circle Award for Best New Work (for Theatre Creation Espace). At the invitation of the French Ministry of Culture, he directed Michele Linfante's Flight Nurse for Theatre Creation Espace in Paris, Lausanne and Berlin. In recent seasons, he's assisted Jack O'Brian on Porgy and Bess at Radio City Music Hall and worked with Robert Wilson on Edison and Medea. A Rutgers graduate, he's received grants and honors from the Shubert Foundation, Wurlitzer Foundation and the National Endowment for the Arts. He's currently preparing for the premiere of Meridel Le Sueur's recently discovered Depression-era drama, O Prairie Girl, Be Lonely.

CHRISTOPHER "KIT" BOND (Audio Designer) served as Stage Manager and Production Stage Manager for the national tours of Best Little Whorehose in Texas and Eubie. He has worked with the national touring companies of Old Vic, Joseph and the amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, One Mo' Time and Peter Pan. As an audio specialist, he has designed sound systems for a number of top road productions, including Death Trap, The Wiz, Da, Chapter

Two, Eubie, The Elephant Man, Your Arms Too Short to Box With God and One Mo' Time. A former technical director at the Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, Mr. Bond hails from the Blue Ridge Mountains.

TOM McPhillips (Set Designer)-studied at St. Martin's School of Art in London and later worked for England's Young Vic and National Opera. He served as scenic artist for several London studios and has had his own scenic shop, creating for television, film, theatre, opera, exhibits and trade shows since 1977. He is the art director for numerous music videos, including those for Paul McCartney, Stevie Wonder and Ashford & Simpson. He art directs many British TV commercials and is currently set designer for Children's ITV, seen daily in England. As an associate with Gaslight Production Services in London, Mr. McPhillips has designed sets for several major rock tours (U.K. and U.S.A.), including those for Culture Club, Ozzy Osborne, Dio, Judas Priest and Nik Kershaw.

THOMAS SKELTON (Lighting Designer) -has a rich background in ballet, musical comedy and the legitimate theatre. His recent credits include Death of a Salesman (for both the Dustin Hoffman and George Scott revivals), Camelot, Brigadoon, Peter Pan, Oklahoma!, West Side Waltz. Lena Horne and Absurd Person Singular: ballets for Robert Joffrey, Heinz Poll, Eliot Feld, Jerome Robbins and the recent seasons of Makarova, Nureyev and the American Ballet Theatre. Other credits include Shenandoah, Purlie, Jimmy Shine, Coco, A Matter of Gravity, Your Own Thing, The Glass Menagerie and Caesar and Cleopatra. Mr. Skelton is associate director of the Ohio Ballet, teaches at NYU's Studio & Forum of Stage Design and has taught at the graduate school at Yale.

NANCY POTTS (Costume Designer)-a five-time Tony Award nominee, Ms. Potts is one of theatre's most versatile and highly acclaimed costume designers, with over 150 productions to her credit, including more than 60 on Broadway and Off-Broadway. She won the Theatre Yearbook Design Award for Hair on Broadway, as well as special citations in Europe and Japan. Other Broadway credits include You Can't Take It With You, Porgy and Bess and Most Happy Fella. Other productions include Kurt Weill's Street Scene by the New York City Opera; repertory productions at the Brook lyn Academy of Music; and numerous regional productions across the U.S., including those at the Kennedy Center, Guthrie Theatre, Goodman Theatre, San Diego Shakespeare Festival, Los Angeles Civic Light Opera, and Hollywood's Huntington Hartford.

HOWARD LEONARD (Hair Designer)—a hairdresser/designer for eight years, Mr. Leonard's theatrical projects include the Broadway productions 42nd Street, Pippin, Dancin' and Chaplin. He toured with the national companies of Sophisticated Ladies, Beatlemania and Sugar Babies, with the latter as Ann Miller's personal hairdresser. Mr. Leonard has a special fondness for films of the 30's and 40's and specializes in period hairstyles. He hopes to bring the style and quality of Hollywood's heyday to the contemporary stage.

RICHARD SMALLWOOD (Author, Musical Director, Vocal Arranger)—a renowned composer, pianist and singer, Mr. Smallwood is the guiding force behind the Richard Smallwood Singers. Their 1984 album, Psalms, was Number One on Billboard's Gospel chart for 14 weeks and nominated for a Grammy as Best Gospel Album. He

graduated cum laude from Howard University and lectured at the University of Maryland. He is a leader among gospel singer/ musicians now combining European influences with the fervor of gospel. He was the first gospel artist to appear at the Montreux Jazz Festival and in 1977, he represented the U.S. at the Paris Falls Festival in France. He was cited by the Smithsonian Institution as a gospel innovator and has received the James Cleveland Gosnel Award and Washington D.C.'s Mayoral Act Award, Mr. Smallwood has performed with a variety of gospel, jazz and classical artists, including Leontyne Price (White House Command Performance), Edwin Hawkins (Gospel at the Symphony), Tremaine Hawkins, Larnell Harris and Donald Byrd

JOHN SIMMONS (Ovchestratot)—a pianist, guitarist and arranger, Mr. Simmons is currently Stephanie Mills musical director. He has served as arranger for The Three Degrees and piano accompanist for Valerie Simpson, Melba Moore and Cissy & Whitney Houston. Mr. Simmons was pianist and assistant musical director for the national and Japanese touring companies of The Wiz and the musical director and vocal arranger for Billy Wilson's Dancin In The Streets. He has recorded back-up vocals for The Reflections, Harry Belalonte, The Weather Girls, Larry Graham and Esther Marrow.

MICHAEL POWELL (Conductor)—has worked on Broadway with Bette Midler, Jennifer Holliday, Patt La Belle, Al Green and Josephine Baker. He was musical director for the Broadway and Paris companies of Your Arms Too Short To Bax With God and is currently musical director for Gelfen Records recording artist, Jennifer Holliday.

TIMOTHY GRAPHENREED (Musical Supervisor, Dance Arranger)-is a Broadway dance composer and arranger. For George Faison: The Wiz (Tornado, Emerald City), Mooney Shapiro Songbook; for Michael Peters, the current Leader of the Pack and Comin' Uptown, starring Gregory Hines. Graphenreed has also been an Off-Broadway dance arranger for the tap dance genius Henry Tetang for Shim-Sham, starring Hinton Battle, and Sing Me Sunshine. Additionally, he was an Off-Broadway musical director/arranger for Pat Birch's American Passion. Upcoming projects include Apollo and Hey: Alan!, a new musical with collaborator Richard Ford.

ROBERT EDWARD LAYNE (Producer)—
a native of Cambridge, Massachusetts, Mr.
Layne is a graduate of Boston University,
where he majored in education for children
with special needs. His early experiences
involved producing plays with handicapped and emotionally disturbed youngsters. He then moved from a private elementary school setting to a community
college environment, where he taught for
several years. In 1975 he returned to school,
this time to major in administration and
management. After receiving an advanced
degree, he joined the management team at
the B&R Corporation.

MARTY BRONSON (Producer)—has a thirty year background in theatre as an actor, designer, director and producer. He directed and produced the premiere of Lawrence and Lee's Crocodile Smile and was on the State University of New York's Committee for Development of Theatre Arts Programs. Since the mid-1970's he has been a leading producer, director and exhibition designer for industrial and fashion shows in the U.S., Europe and Japan. His productions include all seven of Harvey's

Bristol Cream's Tribute to Black Designers: the '78, '79, '82 and '84 Coty American Fashion Critics Award: and a Las Vegas fashion evening sponsored by AMF Head, Let's Turn Snow Into Gold, which raised money for the U.S. Olympic Ski Feams, Mr. Bronson's additional credits include Paul Poiret: King of Fashion, American Living/Turn of the Century, Fortuny and most recently, the much acclaimed exhibition, Parkinon and Broadway.

LOUIS G. BOND (Producer)—The Rev. Dr. Louis G. Bond, born in Baltimore, Maryland and the pastor of St. Andrews United Methodist Church in Worcester, Massachusetts for the past 12 years, brings a wide range of business, musical and church experience to the production of Sing, Mahafia, Sing. A Harvard graduate, Dr. Bond is the president and chairman of the board of B&R Corporation, a conglomerate with manufacturing, oil and real estate interests, among others, all of which are minority owned and operated. Previously, Dr. Bond was the president of Roxbury Community College and the administrator of the National Center for Afro-American Artists, Inc., a teaching and performing institution which contained several dance companies and a museum. Dr. Bond is also a trained concert pianist.

TAD SCHNUGG (Producer)—As George Faison's personal manager and associate since 1969, Tad Schnugg has worked closely


with the director/choreographer on all of his theatrical and entertainment ventures. For the George Faison Universal Dance Experience, the acclaimed company which toured thoughout the U.S. from 1971–1976, Mr. Schnugg served as lighting designer, stage and general manager and booking agent. Additionally, Mr. Schnugg, who studied theatre and literature in Germany, served on the Board of Directors of the Richard Allen Center for Culture and Art and as their advisor/consultant, as well.

MAHALIA JACKSON

MATIALIA JACKSON established herself as the world's greatest, most famous and beloved gospel singer. Hers was a 45 year career which began in neighborhood black churches and culminated in gala performances on concert stages around the globe. She was a powerful Good Will Ambassador for America, a pivotal figure in the civil rights movement, an astute businesswoman and the living embodiment of her life-long faith. She was born in poverty in New Orleans on October 26, 1911. Her mother died when Mahalia was six and she spent her following early years in the care of her stern and religious Aunt Duke, Mahalia started singing in her church choir at the age of five. She was baptized at the age of 12 and decided from then on to "dedicate my life to Him in song," Mahalia left school after the eighth grade to help support her family. She moved to Chicago when she was 16, lived with her Aunt Hannah and joined the Greater Salem Baptist Church, becoming a soloist with the choir. She also sang with The Johnson Singers, a gospel quintet which performed in black churches and tent revivals throughout the mid-west. In

1945 she recorded "Move On Up A Little Higher" for Apollo Records and sold one million copies. She achieved widespread popularity throughout Europe and word of Mahalia's resounding voice slowly started to work its way back to America. Her first sold-out concert at Carnegie Hall was in 1950 and she sang there annually for many years. In 1952 she made her first tour of Europe. Most of the 30 albums she recorded in her career were for Columbia and at least a dozen of her singles achieved Gold Record status. Among her most popular songs were "He's Got the Whole World In-His Hands," "I Can Put My Trust In Jesus," "When I Wake Up In Glory," "Just A Little While To Stav Here," "Upper Room," "Didn't It Rain," "Even Me" and "Silent Night," Mahalia sang at President John F. Kennedy's inauguration and appeared in command performances for the late Prime Minister Indira Gandhi and the King and Queen of Denmark. She appeared in several films, including Imitation of Life, St. Louis Blues, The Best Man and I Remember Chicago. She received countless awards and succeeded in developing a huge

international, multi-racial, multi-religious audience. Mahalia sang of faith in Jesus, but the purity and power of her faith, as well as her talent, permitted her to cross a multitude of barriers. The late Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. was a close friend and only after her death was the full extent of her financial support to the Movement revealed. At Dr. King's request, Mahalia sang before the 200,000 people assembled for the 1963 March on Washington and her performance contributed hugely to making the March one of the most memorable moments in American history. Mahalia Jackson died of heart failure at the age of 60 on January 27, 1972. There were two enormous funerals-one in New Orleans, the other in Chicago, President Richard Nixon issued a White House statement, saying "America and the world...mourn the passing of Mahalia Jackson ... all her years she poured out her soul in song and her heart in service to her people. Millions of ears will miss the sound of her great rich voice 'making a joyful noise unto the Lord' "
